Curry Mallet and Beercrocombe Village Hall

Following the village hall investment plan, we have been able to install 24 PV panels and batteries in October. These should provide at least 70% independence from the grid and contribute recurring feed-in tariff



payments of several hundred pounds per annum based on current FIT rates. The batteries are placed in the entrance lobby and will not be an obstruction to the main doors.

We have also raised funds to support the installation of infra-red heating panels in the main hall and meeting room which will start at the end of October. This will improve the thermal comfort of both areas and with wi-fi thermostats we will be able to control temperatures remotely.

The committee will discuss the temperature levels and controls with user groups and it is expected we have an 'open day' to show off our improvements and see if other user groups could attend - we need more to balance the books!

The committee have worked hard to make these improvements which is for the benefit of whole community. Great thanks go to Chris Dale who has been very successful in obtaining grants; the cost of the PV panels and batteries is covered in full and about three quarters of the IR cost. Fantastic work! Grants have been provided by the National Lottery, ACRE, Somerset Community Foundation, Clarks, Beercrocombe Village Trust and Parish Council, and the users - Short Mat Bowls, Round Window Club, VEG, plus a generous anonymous donation. Thanks also to Forest Electrical Ltd and AVS Ltd, our local providers, especially AVS who provided the work without charging for installation.

On Saturday 23rd November the village hall will be open to show the new heating and PV panels and batteries. We will start at 2pm for a couple of hours and complimentary Prosecco, tea and coffee will be available.

Beercrocombe Village Book Box

During the summer of 2024 a group of Beercrocombe parishioners undertook a major refurbishment of the BT K6 Kiosk bought by the Parish in 2009. Since 2009 it has served as a book exchange and has become a much appreciated asset. On 20 August 2024 villagers gathered to raise a glass to our new Book Box.

As ever the background to these village events provides a useful reminder of the importance of the Parish Council and parishioner participation in our community. In 2008, Julia Wright, a Parish Councillor, heard of the BT proposal to sell off their kiosks and raised the idea of buying our defunct telephone box for the parish. In spite of general scepticism from other members of the Council, including myself, she worked through all the bureaucracy of buying the kiosk and getting the electricity disconnected by Western Power. The latter was, in comparison to the £1 purchase price of



the kiosk, costly and to fund this expense Julia formed a Friends of the Telephone Kiosk group that raised about £100 from supporting villagers. Following this local fund raising the District Council also gave us a grant of £250 which was ring fenced for Kiosk Maintenance. By July the following year the Parish Council had rallied around the proposal and voted unanimously to buy the Kiosk. Parishioner Chris Dale and other 'Friends' then repainted the Kiosk and converted the interior to book shelving. Looking back we should all be thankful to Julia and the Friends of the Telephone Kiosk for their forethought.





I hope this little story reminds parishioners that living within a rural parish is not just a place of abode, but means being part of a community for which participating can bring large rewards for everyone.

Dear friends, neighbours and customers,

It is with a heavy heart that I am writing this to you.

Unfortunately, I have had to make the decision to sell The Bell Inn.

Whilst I have tried my hardest to provide something for everyone in our pub, it is no longer financially viable for me to continue. I

have invested everything I have into the pub but it has become harder and harder to make enough money to pay the monthly bills.

I am hoping that I find a buyer quickly and if that's the case, I'll try and keep the doors open whilst going through that process, but in order to do that I'll need your help. In addition to mortgage costs and the cost of the products we sell, there is electricity, water, wages, gas, oil etc. that all need to be paid to keep the doors open. Every purchase, whether it is a coffee, pint of beer or a plate of nachos helps. The harsh reality is that if I cannot pay this months bills, I will need to find a job and I would then have to close until a sale happens.

If there are any residents who would like to look at turning the pub into a community owned venture, then I'd be happy to discuss this possibility. This could be the way to ensure the pub stays in the village for the foreseeable future. There are apparently still grants available via the Community Ownership Fund but I believe this will end in March 2025.

I'd like to thank all those of you who have supported us, whether it's been popping in for a regular coffee and a chat, or having a meal or a drink on a regular basis. You have kept us going this long and we appreciate your efforts.

We still have a few events lined up before Christmas which we hope will be well supported, as well as our regular nights and we would love to see you here showing any prospective new landlords that the Bell Inn is worth keeping open.

If you haven't used the pub since we took over, come in and see us. We'll always make you feel welcome whether you are on your own or with friends. The coffee machine is always on when we're open too so you don't even need to have a beer.

Curry Mallet Community Activities

Kierly's Comet

This column, in the previous issue, made reference to the forthcoming Surface Dressing programme by Somerset Highways' contractor: For many Curry Mallet residents, the work undertaken in August was their first exposure to such treatment, - unsurprisingly given, comet-like, the county's rural lanes are scheduled to receive this treatment only once every ten years. This periodicity assumes clement summer weather conditions between April and September, and sufficient residual budget for the programmed work to be completed in that season; over the past twenty years, planned work has frequently had to be carried over to subsequent years, - sometimes by several years as for Headwell. Compared to previous dressings undertaken since 2004, the work undertaken in August by Kielry appears far superior; the spreading by their Romanian team was executed with great speed, thoroughness and much thicker coverage than hitherto. Hopefully the new surfaces will prove durable and not prone to formation of puddles and then pot holes. Heaven forbid that any utility now wants to dig up these lanes.

Slippery Surfaces

Weatherwise, this has been a most unusual summer, - one report suggesting it to have been the second worst harvest on record. Locally, many fields of maize have yet to be cut and, with ground now substantially saturated, much mud will be deposited on the lanes after the crop has been gathered. As with patches of ice in winter, vehicle braking efficiency is severely diminished over muddy surfaces so, as in the words of a famous F1 racing commentator, unwary drivers "head straight to the scene of the accident". November 2012 experienced similar late harvesting, and a fast-turning tractor flipped its trailer onto its side. On



that occasion, no one was injured, but the agricultural contractor experienced substantial delay through the need to bale out the trailer's load. That year as I recall, in Beercrocombe a car was hit by a utility company's van unable to brake in time due to the slippery surface.

Notes from the Farm

Although not on the scale of Hogwarts where everyone has an owl, we have a pretty good population here, at least with Little Owls and Tawny Owls. Barn Owls have been a much more variable story over the years.

When I was a boy, we had a couple of old barns that had resident Barn Owls and when they were sold off for conversion to houses the Duchy provided an owl box which we duly put up facing out over the orchards. This remained unused apart from a pair of vagrant pigeons that squatted in it for a while. Then we had a visit from the Barn Owl Trust who said that the first box was too small and they put up a second bigger box which had a landing platform built in. However, they didn't tell the owls that the first one wasn't suitable as they then moved into it and stayed for the next three years.

Since then both boxes have been unused and we have only very occasionally seen Barn Owls on the farm which makes me think that the fundamental problem is a lack of suitable habitat rather than accommodation. As I have referred to before we have been undertaking various environmental schemes that should make the area more amenable for the small mammals that make up the owl's diet. There have been signs that this is working without the need for any wizardry. The other day we picked up a dead Barn Owl. Whilst I was disappointed that this one didn't make it I am encouraged that we have them back on the farm at all.


